She stood silently in the hallway of the Shelter, her arms around the shoulders of her ten-year-old daughter, Katy, who stood stone still, eyes wide open. She was clearly afraid. It had been a grueling few days. Her stepdad threatened her mom with a knife, and when Katy tried to intervene, he turned on her. In a rare calm after the storm, her mom apologized and offered to fix his favorite meal as a peace offering. She casually made a list of what she needed, asked him if he needed anything from the store and then headed out, just like always. As usual, Katy jumped in with her and off they went.

But this time, her mom drove past the store, and simply kept going. They drove past her school, past the city limits sign and past her friend, Julie's, farm. There was no need for words; they both knew what she was doing. Fourteen hours, one ATM stop and three states later, they arrived in Dallas and started looking for domestic violence shelters. On one of those calls, someone gave her the hotline number for Mission Granbury, and thankfully, they had a room. Two hours later, an advocate met them at the Sheriff's Office and brought them to the Shelter. They had the clothes on their back and \$95

left to start a new life. Advocates and case managers rallied around them, providing them with a haven from the storm and quietly knitting a safety net of resources to help them start their journey to freedom.

It wasn't that long ago that Lee was a master welder, making good money, paying his bills and putting a little away in savings. Recently married, he and his wife bought what they planned to be their forever home. Life was good. So, when Lee first got sick, he just worked through it. He got his first job at 15 and hadn't taken more than two sick days in the 45 years since. But his body wasn't bouncing back this time. Within weeks, he learned he had cancer, and it was spreading. The next 18 months were rough. Unable to work, he lost his job, his home and eventually, the stress took a toll on his marriage. A friend loaned him a camper to stay in and a kind neighbor let him use an extension cord to power a lamp and a fan or a heater. That friend called Mission Granbury to see if we could help. A case manager contacted Lee and helped him get electric to his camper, signed him up for weekly grocery delivery and told him about Meals on Wheels. The case manager also arranged for Lee to have an emergency phone so he could


